Background

At this point, they are asset for both countries in promoting and voicing the interest of both countries. Most of them have emotional closeness that see the importance of bilateral cooperation between Indonesia and Norway that gives great hope in strengthening the cooperation. However without institutionalised organisation, their contribution has become limited due to lack of regular meeting and their could not be able to build up connection in wider scope especially people to people.

With no longer explanation, it is necessary to establish institutionalised organisation (association) that can cooperate with the well-established diplomacy of both of the government will have an expected outcome none else but strengthened cooperation between Indonesia and Norway.


